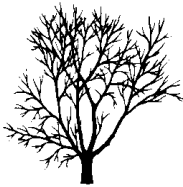
Double Flowering Cherry



The cherry is often planted as a decorative tree for both its flowers (whites and pinks) as well as for its fruit (from yellow to red to black.) This double flowering variety has 30 or more petals in each flower.

The bark is the cherry's most identifiable feature. Retaining most of its smooth, even shiny luster, it becomes marked with horizontal lines which turn yellow and callous. These lines are the breathing pores (lenticels) to let air inside the tree to the inner bark.
