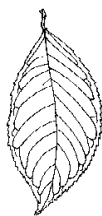


# ArborTags



The leaves are 1-2 inches long and half as wide, finely saw-toothed with a short stem. While the leaf is ordinarily light green, the popular "Atropurpurea" or Pissard Plum has red to purple foliage.

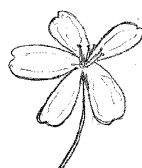

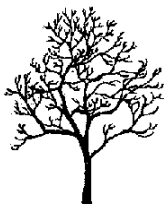
**Cherry Plum**
